Context challenges	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Building the capacity of staff (Teaching and ES) to best support the academic and social/emotional needs of students with additional needs and/or disabilities.- Building teacher and student capability to give and receive feedback to improve student learning growth and teaching practice.- Adjusting the existing Instructional Model in alignment with VTLM 2.0 and PCMS.- Embedding the Distributive Leadership Model that builds the capacity of PLC Leaders and Learning Specialists to establish sustainable routines for collaboration, professional development, classroom observations, internal/external programs, PDPs and the modelling of evidence-based pedagogy and systems for effective feedback.

Intent, rationale and focus

Cheltenham East Primary School (CEPS) recently completed a comprehensive review to guide the development of the next School Strategic Plan (SSP) for 2024-2028. The review focused on student learning and wellbeing outcomes, school practices, and future priorities.

Student Learning and Wellbeing Outcomes:

- Literacy and Numeracy: The school aimed to maximise student growth in literacy and numeracy. While some targets were partially met, others were not achieved, largely due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and periods of remote learning.
- Student Connectedness: Efforts to increase student connectedness through voice, agency, and leadership were partially successful. Although some targets were not met, student feedback indicated a positive and inclusive school environment.
- Wellbeing: The school maintained a safe and inclusive environment, with positive relationships between students and staff. However, attendance and engagement remain areas for improvement.

School Practices:

Leadership: The school experienced leadership changes, stabilising with the appointment of a new principal in 2023. This has led to a positive cultural shift and improved staff collaboration.

Teaching and Learning: Classrooms were observed as positive learning environments. The introduction of a phonics program in early years was noted as a positive step. However, there is a need for a more consistent approach to teaching and learning practices.

Assessment: The school has made progress in using data to inform teaching, but there is room for improvement in formative assessment and goal setting.

Engagement: Students were generally engaged and happy at school. The buddy program and specialist classes were highlights. However, there is a need to revisit the School Wide Positive Behaviours Support (SWPBS) program and address behavioural issues.

Focus Areas for the Next SSP:

Numeracy: Strengthening the numeracy program across all year levels.

Literacy (Writing): Continuing to improve writing outcomes.

Data Use: Building staff capacity to collect and analyse data to inform planning.

Wellbeing: Refreshing the SWPBS program, inclusive of enhancing support for neurodiverse students.

Community Engagement - Continue to strengthen the school's diverse and inclusive environment that celebrates cultural awareness and promotes mutual respect. By embracing and valuing the unique backgrounds, traditions, and

perspectives of all students, staff, and families.

Conclusion: The review highlights the school's commitment to providing a positive and inclusive learning environment. While there are areas for improvement, the school is well-positioned to build on its strengths and address challenges in the next strategic plan.
